While the secular (non-religious) day usually begins at **midnight**, and when we think of "starting the day" we usually think of the **morning**, but the Jewish day is different. When does the Jewish day start?

After the Bar'chu, which calls the community to worship and makes sure we're ready to pray, the next thing we do is say a prayer blessing God for creation: either *Ma'ariv Aravim* ("Bringer of the Evening") for an evening service, or *Yotzer Or* ("Creator of Light") for a morning service.

COMMUNAL prayers are said to address the COMMUNITY's needs. Some communal prayers can still be said alone; the subject matter and purpose within the service makes a prayer communal more than anything else.

This prayer could arguably be a little of both, but it does lean a little in one direction.
